Example of screen Text Display:Playback





### Selecting the Language




You can use the "SET-UP" menu on this camera to select "ENGLISH" or "FRANCAIS" as the "LANGUAGE" used for screen display ( $\Rightarrow$ P.62, 63). The screens in this manual are shown in "ENGLISH".

#### Attaching the Lens Cap and Shoulder Strap




①Pull the lens cap cord through the strap mount.

②Fit and remove the lens cap by squeezing the left and right sides of the cap.



Attach the shoulder strap to the strap mounts on the camera. Once you have attached both ends of the strap, check carefully to ensure that the strap is firmly secured.

Attach the Lens Cap



To prevent the lens cap from appearing in the shot when you take pictures, attach the lens cap to the shoulder strap.

Failure to attach the shoulder strap correctly can

#### result in the camera being dropped.

### LOADING THE BATTERIES


#### **Compatible batteries**

Use AA-size alkaline batteries (4 pcs.) or AA-size nickel-metal hydride (Ni-MH) batteries (4 pcs.).

\*You cannot use lithium, manganese or nickelcadmium (Ni-Cd) batteries.

Notes on Handling Batteries

- Do not use different types of batteries or old and new batteries together.
- The operating lives of alkaline batteries vary between brands and the life of the batteries may be shorter than the alkaline batteries provided with the camera. Note also that due to the nature of alkaline batteries, the time for which they can be used is shorter in cold locations (at temperatures of +10°C or below), so the use of Ni-MH batteries is recommended.
- Soiling (fingerprints, etc) on the terminals of batteries can greatly reduce the time for which the batteries provide power.
- You will need the optional battery charger (⇒P.75) to recharge Ni-MH batteries.
- See P.78 for notes on using batteries.



①Slide the battery cover out and lift it open. 2 Insert the batteries correctly as indicated by the polarity icons. ③Close the battery cover.

Do not apply excessive force to the battery cover.

- Take care not to drop the batteries when you open or close the battery cover.
- The settings are retained for approximately 60 minutes after the batteries are removed. To keep the current settings. ensure that the new batteries are fitted within 60 minutes.
- Vou should carry a spare set of batteries (sold 13 separately) when taking pictures.






- ①Check that the camera is switched off (➡P.16) and then open the slot cover in the direction indicated by the arrow.
- <sup>(2)</sup>Push the SmartMedia firmly into the SmartMedia slot as far as it will go.

③Close the slot cover.


- If you open the slot cover while the camera is still switched on, the camera is automatically switched off to protect the SmartMedia.
- The SmartMedia will not slide fully into the slot if it is inserted facing the wrong way. Be careful not to apply undue force to the SmartMedia.

### **REMOVING THE SmartMedia**<sup>™</sup>



- ①Check that the indicator lamp is green and then switch the camera off.
- ②Open the slot cover in the direction indicated by the arrow.


Never open the slot cover while the camera is still switched on as this could corrupt the image files on the SmartMedia or damage the SmartMedia itself.



Grip the SmartMedia and pull it out.

- To protect the SmartMedia, always store it in the special anti-static case.

### **SWITCHING ON AND OFF**



To switch the camera on and off, press the "POWER" button. When you switch the camera on, the indicator lamp turns green. If the date has been cleared, a confirmation message appears.

In Still Image mode or Movie mode, the confirmation message appears in the viewfinder (EVF). In Playback mode, the message appears on the LCD monitor.

(○K): The DATE/TIME setting menu appears (➡P.18).
 (BACK): The camera remains in Still image, Movie or playback mode.



- Switch the camera on and check the batteries charge indicator.
- ①Batteries have ample charge (No indicator displayed).
- ②The batteries charge is low. Have a new set of batteries ready.
- ③The batteries are exhausted. The display will shortly go blank and the camera will stop working. Replace or recharge the batteries.
- If you do not set the date and time, this confirmation message will appear each time you switch the camera on.

Take care not to touch the lens when you switch the camera on.

Auto Power Off function ◆
If the camera is not used in any way for 2 minutes, the Auto Power Off function automatically switches the camera off. However, this function does not operate when you are using a USB connection.

### SETTING THE DATE AND TIME



①Press the "MENU/OK" button to display the menu screen.


②Use "◀▶" or "▲ (♫) ▼ (☷)" to select "SET–UP" from the "OPTION" menu. ③Press the "MENU/OK" button.


If the date was cleared and you selected "OK", proceed from step  $3 \rightarrow P.18$ .

①The "SET–UP" menu appears. Use "▲ (□)" or "▼ (□)" to select "DATE/TIME".
 ② Press "▶".

- Change the batteries within approximately 60 minutes. The camera settings are only retained for approximately 60 minutes once the batteries are removed.

### SETTING THE DATE AND TIME





The "SET–UP" menu reappears. Press the "MENU/OK" button to complete the settings.

- ①Use "◄" or "▶" to select the desired item and then use "▲ (□)" and "▼ (□)" to correct the setting.
   ②When you have finished setting the date and time,
- press the "MENU/OK" button to confirm the setting.
- When the time displayed passes "12:00:00", the AM/PM setting automatically switches.
- You cannot set the seconds. To set the time precisely, press the "MENU/OK" button when the

If the date was cleared and you selected "OK", the camera switches to photography or playback mode without returning to the "SET–UP" menu.

### **USING THE OPTIONAL AC POWER ADAPTER**

### AC power adapter (optional)


Always use a FUJIFILM AC Power Adapter AC-5V. Use the AC power adapter in situations when a loss of power will cause problems, such as during file downloading (via the USB connection). Using the AC power adapter also allows you to take pictures and play back images without worrying about depleting the batteries.

Compatible AC power adapters
 Model: AC-5VH/AC-5VHS



See P.80 for notes on using the AC power adapter.
 Only connect or disconnect the AC power adapter when the camera is switched off.

Connecting or disconnecting the AC power adapter while the camera is switched on temporarily interrupts the power supply to the camera, so that images or movies being shot at the time are not recorded. Failing to switch the camera off first can also result in damage to the SmartMedia or malfunctions during PC connection.



Check that the camera is switched off. Plug the AC power adapter connector into the "DC IN 5V" socket and then plug the AC power adapter into the power outlet.

- Install the equipment near a socket outlet for easy accessibility.
- The shapes of the AC power adapter, the plug and socket-outlet depend on the country.

Connecting the AC power adapter does not allow you to charge the Ni-MH batteries. Use the optional battery charger ( $\rightarrow$ P.75) to charge the Ni-MH batteries.



Set the Mode switch to "**D**". • Focal range: Approx. 80 cm (2.6 ft.) to infinity

- Take care not to press on the lens with your fingers when the lens extends or when you are taking pictures as this could cause a camera fault.
- ✓ For subjects closer than 80 cm (2.6 ft.), use Macro photography (→P.41).
- If "(I CARD ERROR)", "(I CARD NOT INITIALIZED)" or

"<u>IWRITE ERROR</u>" is displayed, first wipe the contact surface on the SmartMedia (gold-colored area) thoroughly with a soft, dry cloth and then reload the SmartMedia




Immediately after you select Photography mode, the viewfinder (EVF) switches on. You can choose whether to use the viewfinder (EVF) or the LCD monitor to take pictures by pressing the "EVF/LCD" button to switch between the two.


You can specify individually whether the viewfinder (EVF) or the LCD monitor is used in the Still Image, Movie and Playback modes.

\* The selection reverts to the default setting when you switch the camera off.



Put your arm through the shoulder strap so that the strap is looped around your shoulder. Hold the camera grip with your right hand and use your left hand to support the camera (lens) securely.






Be careful to ensure that the lens, flash, microphone and flash control sensor are not obscured by your hands or the shoulder strap.

The camera may not be able to take successful pictures if your fingers or the strap are in the way.
 Check that the lens is clean. If it is dirty, clean the lens as described on P.77.

### STILL IMAGE MODE **TAKING PICTURES (AUTO MODE)**





Frame the shot so that the subject fills the entire AF (Auto Focus) frame.

To zoom in on the subject, press "III" (TELE). To zoom out, press "III" (WIDE). A "Zoom bar" appears on the screen when you zoom in or out.

### Optical zoom focal distance (35mm camera equivalent)

Approx. 38 mm to 228 mm Maximum zoom scale: 6×


Zooming stops briefly when the camera switches between optical zoom and digital zoom ( P.28). In some conditions it may be difficult to see your subject clearly on the screen (Such as in sunny weather outdoors.). In such situations, use the electronic viewfinder to take the shot.

If the subject is not in the AF frame, use AE/AF lock to take the picture (➡P.26).

When you press the shutter button down halfway, the video image on the screen freezes briefly. However, this is not the image that is recorded.

If the shot is too dark to focus, try standing about 2

m (6.6 ft.) from your subject to take the picture.





Press the shutter button down halfway. The camera is focused when the AF frame on the screen shrinks and the green indicator lamp stops blinking and stays lit.

- If you press the shutter button down fully in one motion, the shot is taken without the AF frame changing.
- The indicator lamp flashes orange while the flash is charging. The screen may go dark for a moment. This is normal and does not indicate a fault.
- The flash charging time may increase when the battery charge gets ting lower.



To take the picture, press the shutter button down fully without lifting your finger off it. The camera beeps and takes the picture, and the data is then recorded.

- When you press the shutter button, there is a very short delay before the picture is actually taken.
- Since the amount of image data recorded is not fixed and varies depending on the subject (level of image detail, etc.), the number of available shots may not decrease after the image is recorded, or may decrease by 2.

See P.83 – 85 for information on the warning displays.

The indicator lamp turns orange during image recording and no further shots can be taken. Do not switch the camera off or open the slot cover during image recording as this could corrupt the image files.

### Subjects Not Suitable for Autofocus

Though the FinePix2800 ZOOM uses an accurate autofocus mechanism, it may have difficulty focusing or not be able to focus at all for the types of subject and situation listed below. In such cases, the image may be out of focus.

- Very shiny subjects such as a mirror or car body.
- Subjects photographed through glass.
- Subjects that do not reflect well, such as hair or fur.
- Subjects with no substance, such as smoke or flames.
- When the subject is distant and dark.
- When there is very little contrast between the subject and the background (such as white walls or subjects dressed in the same color as the background).
- When a subject other than your main subject is close to the AF frame, has good contrast and is in front of or behind your main subject (such as a strongly contrasting person standing out against the background).

Subjects moving at high speed.


In situations of this sort, use the AF/AE lock ( $\Rightarrow$ P.26).

### Number of Available Shots

The number of available shots appears on the screen.

See P.64 for information on changing the File Size (Image Size) and Quality setting.

At shipment, the default settings are "IM" (file size) and "N : NORMAL" (quality).



#### ■ Standard number of shots per SmartMedia<sup>™</sup>

The number of shots that can be recorded onto a SmartMedia card varies slightly depending on the type of subject. Also, the difference between the standard number of shots and the actual number of available shots increases for SmartMedia with a higher capacity.





In a shot with this type of composition, the subjects (two people in this case) are not in the AF frame. If the shot is taken at this point, the subjects will not be in focus.

Move the camera slightly so that one of the subjects in the AF frame.



On the FinePix2800 ZOOM, when you press the shutter button down half way, the focus and exposure settings are fixed (AF/AE lock). ### **4** Forced Flash

Use this mode to photograph backlit scenes, such as a subject against a window or in the shade of a tree, or to obtain the correct colors when you are shooting under lighting such as fluorescent tubes. In this mode, the flash fires in bright as well as dark conditions.

#### — Red-Eye Effect

When you use the flash to photograph people in low-light conditions, their eyes sometimes appear red in the picture. This is caused by the light of the flash reflecting off the inside of the eye. Use Red-Eye Reduction flash to effectively minimize the likelihood of the red-eye effect.

### Suppressed Flash

When you use Suppressed Flash, the Automatic White Balance function ( $\rightarrow$ P.89) operates so that natural colors are captured along with the ambience of the available light.

### PLAYBACK MENU 🕒 HOW TO SPECIFY PRINT OPTIONS (DPOF)



DPOF stands for Digital Print Order Format and refers to a format that is used for recording printing specifications for images shot using a digital camera on media such as SmartMedia. The recorded specifications include information on which frames are to be printed and how many prints of each frame are required.

This section gives a detailed description of how to order your prints with the FinePix2800 ZOOM. On the FinePix2800 ZOOM, you can specify only one print per image in the DPOF settings.

- \* Note that some printers do not support date and time imprinting or specification of the number of prints.
- \* Note that the warnings shown below may be displayed while you are specifying the prints.



When you have finished specifying the DPOF settings, always press the "MENU/OK" button to confirm the settings.

If you press the "BACK" button, no DPOF settings are specified.

You can only specify one print per frame in the DPOF settings. Note also that you can specify prints for up to 999 frames on the same SmartMedia.

Pressing the "MENU/OK" button confirms all the settings. You cannot reset a portion of the settings without resetting them all.

# Notes on Using Your Camera Correctly

▶Be sure to read this information in conjunction with "Safety Notes" (→P.92), to ensure that you use vour camera correctly.

### Places to Avoid

Do not store or use the camera in the following types of locations:

- In the rain or in very humid, dirty or dusty places.
- In direct sunlight or in places subject to extreme temperature rises, such as in a closed car in summer.
- Extremely cold places.
- Places subject to strong vibration.
- Places affected by smoke or steam.
- Places subject to strong magnetic fields (such as near motors, transformers or magnets).
- In contact with chemicals such as pesticides or next to rubber or vinvl products for long periods of time.

#### Notes on Immersion in Water or Sand

The FinePix2800 ZOOM is particularly adversely affected by water and sand. When you are at the beach or close to water, ensure that the camera is not exposed to water or sand. Take care also not to place the camera on a wet surface. Water or sand inside the camera can cause faults. that may be irreparable.

#### Notes on Condensation

If the camera is carried suddenly from a cold location into a warm place, water droplets (condensation) may form on the inside of the camera or on the lens. When this occurs, switch the camera off and wait an hour before using the camera. Condensation may also form on the SmartMedia card. In this event, remove the SmartMedia and wait a short time before using it again.

#### ■ When the Camera is Unused for Long Periods

If you do not intend to use the camera for a long period, of time remove the batteries and the SmartMedia card before storing the camera.

#### Cleaning Your Camera

- Use a blower brush to remove dust from the lens I CD. monitor screen or viewfinder as these surfaces and then wipe lightly with a soft, dry cloth. If any soiling remains, apply a small amount of lens cleaning liquid to a piece of FUJIFILM lens cleaning paper and wipe gently.
- Do not scratch hard objects against the lens. LCD monitor screen or viewfinder as these surfaces are easily damaged.
- Clean the body of the camera with a soft, dry cloth. Do not use volatile substances such as thinners, benzine or insecticide, as these may react with camera body and cause deformation or remove the coating.

### ■ Using the Camera Overseas

When travelling overseas, do not place your camera in the check-in baggage. Baggage handling at airports may subject baggage to violent shocks, and the camera may be damaged internally even when no external damage is visible. 77

# Notes on the Power Supply

## **Applicable Batteries**

- AA-size alkaline, Ni-MH (nickel-metal hydride) can be used with this camera.
- Do not use AA-size manganese, lithium batteries in your FinePix2800 ZOOM because the heat generated by the batteries could damage the camera or cause malfunctions.
- The operating lives of alkaline batteries vary between brands and the life of batteries you purchase may be shorter than the alkaline batteries provided with the camera.

# Notes on the Batteries

Incorrect use of the batteries could cause them to leak, become hot, ignite or burst. Always observe the precautions given below.

• Do not heat the batteries or throw them into a fire.

- Do not carry or store the batteries with metal objects such as necklaces or hairpins that could come into contact with the metal positive ⊕ and negative ⊖ poles of the battery.
- Do not expose the batteries to fresh or sea water, and take particular care to keep the terminals dry.
- Do not attempt to deform, disassemble or modify the batteries.
- Do not attempt to peel off or cut the battery casing.
- Do not drop, strike or otherwise subject the batteries to
- 78 strong impacts.

- Do not use the batteries that are leaking, deformed, discolored or exhibit any other obvious abnormality.
   Do not store the batteries in very warm or moist locations.
- Bornot store the batteries in very warm of most locations.
   Keep the batteries out of reach of infant and young children.
- When loading the batteries into the camera, ensure that the battery polarity (⊕ and ⊖) is as indicated on the camera.
- Do not use new batteries together with used batteries. In the case of rechargeable batteries, do not use charged and discharged batteries together. Do not use batteries of different types or brands together.
- If you do not intend to use the camera for a long period of time, remove the batteries from the camera. (Note that if the camera is left with the batteries removed, the time and date settings are cleared.)
- The batteries may feel warm immediately after being used. Before removing the batteries, switch the camera off and wait until the batteries cool down.
- When replacing the batteries, always fit 4 new batteries. Here, 'new batteries' refers to either recently purchased unused alkaline batteries, or Ni-MH (nickel metal hydride) batteries that have recently been fully recharged together.
- In cold locations (at temperatures of +10°C/+50°F or below), battery performance deteriorates and the time for which they can be used shortens markedly. This is particularly true of alkaline batteries. In cold conditions, put the batteries in your pocket or a similar place to warm them before loading them into the camera. If you use a body warmer to warm the batteries, ensure that they are not in direct contact with the warmer.

- Soil (such as fingerprints) on the battery terminals can markedly reduce the number of available shots. Carefully wipe the battery terminals clean with a soft dry cloth before loading the batteries.
- $\triangle$  If any liquid at all leaks from the batteries, wipe the battery compartment thoroughly and then load new batteries.
- A If any battery fluid comes into contact with your hands or clothing, flush the area thoroughly with water. Note that battery fluid can cause loss of eyesight if it gets into your eyes. If this occurs, do not rub your eyes. Flush the fluid out with clean water and contact your physician for treatment.

### Disposing of Batteries

When disposing of batteries, do so in accordance with your local waste disposal regulations.

# Notes on Small Rechargeable Batteries (Ni-MH batteries)

- Always use the special battery charger to charge AA-size Ni-MH batteries. Charge the batteries as described in the instructions provided with the battery charger.
- Do not use the battery charger to charge batteries other than those specified for use with the charger.
- Note that the batteries may feel warm immediately after being charged.
- Ni-MH batteries are not charged at shipment. Be sure to charge the batteries before using them.
- The camera mechanism is such that it draws a minute amount of current even when the camera is switched off. Take particular care not to leave Ni-MH batteries in the camera for a long period of time as they can become

excessively discharged and may no longer be usable even when charged.

- Ni-MH batteries self-discharge even when not used. Always charge Ni-MH batteries before using them. If the time for which a battery provides power shortens markedly when it has been correctly charged, this indicates that the battery has reached the end of its effective life and should be replaced.
- Soiling (fingerprints, etc) on the terminals of Ni-MH batteries can greatly reduce the number of available shots. When this occurs, clean the terminals carefully with a soft dry cloth. Then use up the remaining charge in the batteries and recharge them.
- Newly purchased batteries or batteries that have been left unused for an extended period may not be fully charged. (This is indicated by the immediate display of the battery low warning or a low number of available shots.) This is a normal characteristic of the batteries and does not indicate a fault. Repeatedly charging and using the batteries 3 or 4 times will restore them to a normal condition.
- If you repeatedly charge a Ni-MH battery before it is fully discharged, it will suffer from the "memory effect"\*, causing the battery low warning to appear while there is still ample charge remaining in the battery. To restore the batteries to their normal condition, use up all the charge in the batteries before recharging them.
- \* Memory effect: A phenomenon affecting the battery characteristics such that the apparent battery capacity decreases.

# Notes on the Power Supply

## Notes on Using the AC Power Adapter

Always use the AC-5VH/AC-5VHS AC Power Adapter with the FinePix2800 ZOOM Camera.

The use of an AC power adapter other than the AC-5VH/ AC-5VHS could result in damage to your FinePix2800 ZOOM Digital Camera.

• This AC power adapter is designed exclusively for indoor use.

- Plug the connection cord plug securely into the DC input terminal of the FUJIFILM Digital camera.

The SmartMedia card supplied with your FinePix2800 ZOOM camera is a new image recording medium developed especially for use in digital cameras. Each SmartMedia card contains a built-in semiconductor memory chip (NAND flash memory) which is used for storing digital image data.

Because the data is stored electronically, the stored image data can be erased from the card and new data recorded.

### SmartMedia with IDs

The SmartMedia ID is a SmartMedia that has an individually assigned identification number. SmartMedia ID cards can be used with devices that use ID numbers for copyright protection or other purposes. This camera accepts SmartMedia ID cards in the same way as conventional SmartMedia cards.

## ■Storing Data

In the situations listed below, recorded data may be erased (destroyed). Please note that Fuji Photo Film Co., Ltd. accepts no responsibility whatsoever for the loss (destruction) of recorded data.

- \*When the SmartMedia is used incorrectly by the owner or a third party
- \*When the SmartMedia is exposed to static electricity or electrical noise
- \*When the SmartMedia cover is opened or the SmartMedia removed, or when the camera is switched off during data recording, during data erasing/formatting, or during frame advance when

images are being played back.

### ■Notes on Handling SmartMedia

- Take care to hold the SmartMedia straight when you load it into your camera.

# **Explanation of Terms**

### DPOF: Digital Print Order Format

DPOF is a format used for recording information on a storage media (image memory card, etc.) that allows you to specify which of the frames shot using a digital camera are printed and how many prints are made of each image.

### EV:

A number that denotes exposure. The EV is determined by the brightness of the subject and sensitivity (speed) of the film or CCD. The number is larger for bright subjects and smaller for dark subjects. As the brightness of the subject changes, a digital camera maintains the amount of light hitting the CCD at a constant level by adjusting the aperture and shutter speed. When the amount of light striking the CCD doubles, the EV increases by 1. Likewise, when the light is halved, the EV decreases by 1.

### JPEG:

Joint Photographics Experts Group

A file format used for compressing and saving color images. The compression ratio can be selected, but the higher the compression ratio, the poorer the quality of the expanded image.

#### Motion JPEG:

A type of AVI (Audio Video Interleave) file format that handles images and sound as a single file. Images in the file are recorded in JPEG format. Motion JPEG can be played back by QuickTime 3.0 or later.

### PC Card:

A generic term for cards that meet the PC Card Standard.

### PC Card Standard:

A standard for PC cards determined by the PCMCIA.

#### PCMCIA:

Personal Computer Memory Card International Association (US).

#### White Balance:

Whatever the kind of the light, the human eye adapts to it so that a white object still looks white. On the other hand, devices such as digital cameras see a white subject as white by first adjusting the color balance to suit the color of the ambient light around the subject. This adjustment is called matching the white balance. A function that automatically matches the white balance is called **an Automatic White Balance function**.
